Offer the Catholic community and the people of Australia an educational foundation for life to the full, meaning the full development of the person: intellectually, spiritually, physically, morally and emotionally;


Fulfil parents' rights in a democratic, free society to choose the schooling for their children which reflects their own values, beliefs and hopes as Australians; and

Have proven over successive generations that they contribute significantly to the development of the Australian community.

### Who are Catholic schools for?

- Catholic children who through baptism have a right to an education in the Catholic faith in a Catholic school
- Parents and guardians who wish to entrust their childrens' future to Catholic schools because of their explicit goals and acknowledged educational quality

#### **Trends of Australian Schools**






#### Students in Catholic schools, Primary and Secondary Australia 1985-2007






Note ~50% of Catholic students are not in Catholic schools


# Western Australian Teachers in 2008 in Catholic schools







# CHANGE IN GOVERNMENT

**Data and National Performance Reporting** 

- A comprehensive reporting and accountability framework is being developed for COAG endorsement in October
- A range of input controls will be dispensed with and replaced by robust outcome and output measures eg Outcomes, Measures and Targets
- The promotion of social inclusion and reduction of eucational disadvantage, especially among Indigenous children are key high level outcomes

- The Government has committed \$17.2 million in the Budget to establish an Independent National Schools Assessment and Data Centre to collect data and report on key performance measures for schools
- This initiative will ensure transparent and timely National assessment and reporting of literacy and numeracy outcomes and provide robust data to inform future policy
- The non-government schools sector will be consulted in the development of protocols to support the National Data Centre

 Move from Inputs to Outcomes with initiative progress measures and targets.

A Catholic Perspective to the COAG Productivity Agenda

**Indigenous Education** 

 What has happened to date has not worked – we need to be looking at doing things differently
 eg Accelerated Literacy in the East Kimberley

### Improving teacher and school leader quality

- Need to recognise the success of education in Australia and in particular Catholic education in international testing eg PISA & TIMMS
- Recognise the long tail
- Continuous improvement
- Incentive pay to teachers

### **High Standards and Expectations**

Agree – must recognise the dignity of the human person National curriculum must provide flexibility at the local level - subsidiarity

Greater accountability and better directed Resources

Agree – provided accountability does not become a means in itself

Modern world class teaching and learning environments including ICT

Agree – but must be well resourced and needs greater access to Capital grants

Building cost and land costs have escalated

Integrated strategic fees for low socio economic status school communities Agree – Catholic system already cross subsidised – co-responsibility

Boosting parental engagement Agree – Catholic education recognises parents as the prime educators – participation

Most Catholic schools have school boards

# FUTURE

- Catholic education involvement will continue to grow
- 50% of the Catholic students who do not attend Catholic schools will remain constant
- Catholic education will become less diverse
- More non-Catholic teachers in Catholic schools

# FUTURE

- Mass attendance in the foreseeable future will continue to decline
- For many the Catholic school is the only interface Catholic families have with the Church – this will continue
- Because of its size Catholic education can influence government education and social policy

The Holy See, through papal interventions and the documents of the Congregation for Catholic Education, recognises the priceless treasure of Catholic schools as an indispensable instrument of evangelisation. Ensuring their genuinely Catholic identity is the Church's greatest educational challenge. Complementing the primary role of parents in educating their children, such schools, which should be accessible, affordable and available to all, build up the community of believers evangelising the culture and serve the common good.
